

About the Department of Mathematics

College

Sacred Heart College (Autonomous), Tirupattur was founded in the year 1951 by a Spanish Salesian Missionary Rev.Fr.JosephCarreno SDB. It had its humble beginning when it started functioning with 10 teachers and 81 students and in a short span of five decades, it has grown into a research institution, with the view to cater to the needs of the deserving local students. And today it has taken shape as a majestic institution, all to the credit of the Salesians of Don Bosco. The College has been reaccredited with "A" grade by NAAC in November 2006, accredited by NAAC (3rd Cycle) with 3.43 on the 4 points scale at 'A' grade in April 2013 and accredited by NAAC (4th Cycle-under RAF) with 3.31 on the 4 points scale at 'A+' grade in 2019.

Department of Mathematics

Sacred Heart College is an affiliated autonomous College of the newly formed Thiruvalluvar University (formerly affiliated to University of Madras). This is a Catholic Christian Minority Institution of Higher Education, established and administered by the religious Congregation of the Salesians of Don Bosco. The Salesian province of Madras under the leadership of Rev.Fr.JosephCarreno SDB, a Spanish Salesian Missionary founded this College in the year 1951. The establishment of the Department of Mathematics was a natural corollary with the birth of this College.

Rural and backward regions in those days are rare settings in the field of Education. But Institutions of higher education are indispensable in rural areas to remove economic backwardness and intellectual non growth of the millions who belong there. Such a deprived situation challenged the faculty of Mathematics to achieve excellence in the field of higher Education.

Inception

From the very inception of the faculty of Mathematics, academic excellence was the order of the day. During the days of Pre-university, in a notable way, 75 of our Department students were admitted in the Engineering Colleges. The Department achieved very good results at the University Examinations. A respectable number of

university rank holders from the Department of Mathematics stands as testimony for the academic excellence achieved by the Department.

Growth

In the year 1954, the University of Madras upgraded the College as a First Grade College and Mathematics became a full fledged degree course. The Department excelled in the university Examinations. Mathematics Department of this college proudly feel that more than 15 of our students used to enter into various courses in the prestigious Madras Institute of Technology every year, which exceeds the number from any college in Tamil Nadu. It was a witness to the entire state, that, the Department existing in a rural area, a college can reach the peak in academic excellence. Thus, the Department of Mathematics of Sacred Heart College became a model of higher education in rural and backward regions.

In recognition of the hard work and the excellence in academic activities of the Department, the University upgraded the Department vertically to be a Post Graduate Department in the year 1980. The results of the P.G. Department of Mathematics in the University Examinations were the best. As the Department aspired for greater excellence and better service, the Department took a bold step in launching autonomy for the Department.

As the UGC and the University were impressed by the excellent academic record of the Department, autonomy was conferred to the PG Department of Mathematics from the academic year 1987-1988 and for the UG course from the year 1988-1989. Autonomy gave birth to free, creative and dynamic intellectual pursuits in the faculty of Mathematics. Through autonomy, academic doors were opened for the students of the rural area to have a taste of newer areas in the field of Mathematics like

- 1. Graph Theory
- 2. Automata Theory
- 3. Bio Mathematics
- 4. Number Theory and Cryptography
- 5. Operations Research.
- 6. Difference Equations

Finite Element Methods, Financial Mathematics and MATLAB Courses are offered as optional subjects. The curriculum was designed to cater to the needs of the student community in preparing them for competitive examinations and to create interest in the field of research. This naturally forced us to offer more and more application oriented subjects.

Keeping in mind the urgent need of up gradation of the faculty qualitywise, a sequential programme in M.Phil was conducted by the Department during 1985-1986.

Research Activity

The Department motivated themselves to involve in research activities. In the process, 14 research scholars and 9 faculty member have obtained Ph.D degree during the year 2016-2020.440Research papers were published in several National and International Journals by the Faculties of the Department. **Two** National Conferences, **Two** international conferences and **one** state level seminar have been conducted.





The Department has implemented Programmes to provide exposure to enhance the students' learning experience by student centric methods like field trips, industrial visits, case-studies, project based-learning and group discussions.

In addition, guest lectures/invited talks are also arranged for students from time to time. In teaching-learning process, cognitive development like learning, problem-solving, understanding is achieved via video lectures, presentations, industrial visits, quiz, movie screening etc.

The faculty Development Programme and several need-based awareness Programmes, trainings and workshops are arranged from time to time for Faculty and they are motivated and encouraged to publish their research papers in various Scopus/WOS/SCI/UGC journals. The faculty despite of having many challenges is extremely committed in contributing to the intellectual development of the students. Teaching, learning and research are the main focus of the academic pursuit.

Department prepares an academic plan well in advance which is monitored by the HODs. Another remarkable feature of the teaching learning environment is the personal relationship and bond that exist between the teachers and the students. The high learners and the slow learners are identified at the beginning of the academic year. The department has integrated an interactive teaching learning methodology to maintain quality.

There is considerable evidence showing that the continuous assessment supports students' learning. Traditional testing methods are combined with innovative methods such as problem solving, online examinations and seminars to make the learning experience unique. The teachers provide guidance for assignments and seminars. The attendance is Online, carefully monitored and remains free from manipulations. The instructional methods to a certain extent provide the students to think analytically, to understand the premise of the study and communicate confidently.

Performance in each course of study is evaluated based on:

- 1. Continuous Internal Assessment throughout the semester, which is centrally organized.
- 2. Final examination at the end of the semester.

The assessment pattern includes the selection of weightages for different cognitive levels for all tests. The assessment pattern is communicated to all the students at the beginning of the semester. The audit shows the main concern of the department is improving the quality of learning which also involves an assessment to what extent the students master the content of the course. Mentoring and tutoring are well monitored and documented. Remedial teaching is provided for slow learners.

Evaluation

QUESTION PAPER PATTERN FOR UG

Examination System

There are two components in the evaluation and assessment of a student, namely Continuous Assessment (CA) and Semester Examination (SE). The CA will take place during the course of the semester and the semester Examination shall be conducted at the end of each semester, i.e., ODD Semester in October/November and Even Semester in April/May.

Each UG course consists of six semesters.

Semester Examination (SE)

The Maximum Marks for Semester Examination is 70 for UG.

For Semester Examinations: Question paper pattern

The question paper shall have three sections with the maximum of 70 marks for three hours with the following break-up.

Section - A

Section –A shall contain *ten* short answer questions without choice drawn from all the units on the basis of two questions from each unit.

Each question shall carry two marks ($10 \times 2 = 20$). Answer all the questions.

Section-B

Section – B shall contain *five* "EITHER OR" type questions drawn from all the five units. (One "EITHER OR" type question from each unit).

Each question shall carry 4 marks (5 x 4 = 20). Answer all questions.

Section-C

Section – C shall contain *five* questions drawn one each from the 5 units.

3 questions out of 5 are to be answered. Each question shall carry ten marks (3 \times 10=30). Answer any three questions.

Continuous Assessment (CA)

The Maximum Marks for Continuous Assessment is 30 for UG.

For CA Examinations: Question paper pattern

The duration of the examination shall be two hours.

The question paper shall consist of three parts. Maximum Marks of CA question paper is 50.

Section – A: Short Answers (5 x 3 = 15 marks). Answer all the questions.

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Section – B: Medium Answers (with either or type, $3 \times 5 = 15$ marks). Answer all questions.

Section – C: Long Answers (2 out of 3, 2 x10= 20 marks). Answer any Two questions.

The break-up of the internal marks component is as follows:

- (i) Two CA Tests 20 Marks
- (ii) Attendance 5 Marks
- (iii) Cycle Tests/Problem Solving/Class Tests/Assignment/Home Tests 5 Marks

Transparency shall be maintained and the final mark for component (iii) shall be endorsed by the HOD.

Passing Minimum:

A student shall be declared to have passed in a paper, if one secures 40% and above in the Semester Examination and 40% and above in the aggregate of CA and Semester Examinations. Candidates failing in a subject, have to repeat the semester examination in that paper.

6. Outcome of the Students meeting

- 1. PG/ M.Phil., Students are encouraged to publish papers.
- 2. In main elective courses choice is required.
- 3. Latex software is used for M.Sc. project work.
- 4. Skill enhancement paper in the M.Sc. course is very useful for competitive exams.
- In Skill enhancement paper, topics in ODE and PDE could be offered in one
 of the semesters. For facilitating this, skill enhancement papers of Algebra and
 Linear Algebra could be combined.
- 6. In Skill enhancement, students expect more drill in solving problems rather than repeating the same theory studied in core papers.
- To appear for NET/SET examinations, the students expect to have study materials containing objective type questions in skill enhancement papers.
- 8. Both in UG and PG interaction, the students expressed the opinion that some software based papers may be introduced in their curriculum to find placement in industries.
- 9. Students expressed satisfaction about the internal assessment system followed.
- 10. UG students suggested to introduce aptitude papers to take up competitive examinations. At present students from other departments are offered aptitude papers under NME. So these papers could be introduced as certificate courses in order to give initiation for students to prepare for competitive examinations.
- 11. In class quality circle PG students proposed to have more problem solving sessions.

Outcome of the Research Scholars Meeting

- 1. Research scholars expressed satisfaction over the following
 - Research facility available in the campus.
 - Research interaction with the guides everyday.
 - Celebrating Research day.
 - Involving Research scholars in all academic activities of the department including teaching certificate courses and In-House lectures.
 - Encouragement to publish papers in Scopus/WOS journals.
 - Seed money provided for research scholars.

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- 2. Research scholars made a fervent request of the following
 - As Maths research scholars do not make use of lab facilities, they requested for reduction in annual college fees.
 - Financial assistance may be given to deserving research scholars to meet hostel expenses.
 - To promote women scholars to do Ph.D., women scholars requested for additional financial assistance.

7. Outcome of the Faculty meeting

- 1. Registration fee may be provided for self financing staff for presenting papers in seminars/conferences.
- 2. On Duty (OD) leave for self financing staff may be granted for attending seminar and conferences for the entire duration.
- 3. The staff members are publishing research articles and doing research on a regular basis. As a token of appreciation, the management is giving Rs. 2000, Rs.1000 for published papers in Scopus/Web of Science and UGC approved journal respectively.
- 4. The staff members feel that there is lack of space for conducting department association activities.
- 5. The staff members have established collaboration and contacts with academic community to enhance research output.
- 6. Promotion and monetary benefits for the self-financing staff may be given in due time.

8. Overall Assessment

Strengths of the Department

- 1. The Department has dedicated and committed faculty members.
- 2. Faculty members of the department are all qualified as per UGC norms with Ph.D., and NET/SET qualification.
- 3. From student enrollment it is observed that the department attracts a good number of students to register for studying mathematics.
- 4. UGC introduced the requirement of publishing a paper by M.Phil. Scholars since 2018. But the college introduced this since 2015-16. This is one of the best practices followed by the department to enhance research.

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- 5. All PG projects are checked for similarity index using the Turnitin tool. The acceptable level of similarity would be 40% for the whole project document.
- 6. All M.Phil., dissertations are checked for *similarity index* using the Turnitin tool. The acceptable level of similarity would be 30% for the whole dissertation.
- 7. The practice of checking for similarity index compels students to become aware of plagiarism in research. When these students take up research they will be able to produce high quality papers in research. This is another best practice observed by the external audit members.
- 8. Audit team observes that the department is equipped with good infrastructure and learning resources.
- 9. The department has carried out commendable research work even without funding from government agencies.
- 10. The department regularly conducts conferences and workshops.
- 11. The department is vibrant with research activities culminating to the awarding of 26 Ph.D.'s and 22 scholars currently pursuing Ph.D.
- 12. The research publication by the faculty members is highly commendable as there are 197 publications in UGC approved journals and 142 publications in Scopus/WOS indexed journals in the past 5 years. The external expert team appreciates that all Ph.D.,/M.Phil., guides have Google scholar citation index.
- 13. The External expert team observes a high level of cohesiveness among the faculty.
- 14. The External peer team observes another best practice of the department in publishing articles in collaboration with mathematicians in foreign countries.
- 15. There is yet another best practice of research guides being referees and reviewers for Scopus/WOS indexed journals and international databases respectively.
- 16. The External peer team comes to know that the scholars are giving In-House lectures for UG and PG students. This practice will be a great motivating factor for taking PG students to research.
- 17. The effort of bringing the journal Journal of Computational Mathematica- is highly laudable.
- 18. It is highly appreciable that Academia for Advanced Research in Mathematics (AARM) society is functioning since 2019. This will pave way for researchers in mathematics to come to know about paper publications, conferences, collaborative research, projects etc. that will disseminate science ideas even to common public.

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Weakness

- 1. As the students hail from villages, it takes time for them to fall in line as per the expectation of the higher educational institution.
- 2. The expert team observes that there is lack of physical space for documentation.
- 3. Summer project (Internship) for both UG and PG may be introduced.
- 4. Fast learners and slow learners need to be identified at the beginning of the academic year. Remedial measures have to be initiated well in advance of the announcement of the examinations.
- 5. The HOD may be given a spacious room.

Opportunities

- 1. For the Journal of Computational Mathematica getting scopus index is suggested.
- 2. Already staff members are publishing research papers in collaboration with mathematicians in foreign countries. This may be converted into MOU's and international projects paving way for effective research activities and attracting funds.
- 3. Already staff members have Google scholar citation index. If the staff members can get Scopus/WOS citation index, this will enhance the credibility of the research work with international research community.
- 4. For each course 6 Course Outcomes (CO) can be given as per Benjamin Bloom's Taxonomy.
- 5. In examination pattern, there can be 40 % of questions for lower order cognitive complexity and 60% of questions can be addressed for higher order cognitive complexity. This may be indicated in the question paper itself.

Challenges

- Having interaction with notable alumni and conducting alumni chapters will bring
 a lot of placement opportunities for students. This may bring resources to the
 department.
- 2. Making internal: external in assessments as 50:50 will pave way for the exercise of the autonomy in the right sense.
- 3. Introducing innovative components for internal assessment will nurture students cognitive skills.

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Throngs

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- Conducting MCQ test as a comprehensive examination at the end of the PG programme will prepare students for NET/SET/GATE examinations.
- 5. The department and the college can explore the possibility of introducing Outcome Based Education (OBE) in its totality.



About 100 students are being inducted under this programme and are being rigoursly trained to obtain employability.

RENOVATION OF BUILDINGS

INSTALLATION OF CCTV CAMERAS

SCHOLARSHIPS

SCHOLARSHIP FOR SC/ST

Our institution has made a deliberate effort to get scholarships for impoverished students from government and non-governmental organizations, so that their socioeconomic status does not become a barrier to their study. I am delighted to share with you the information of the numerous scholarships awarded to our students.

- Government Scholarships benefitted 3120 students with an amount of Rs. 2,59,70,391
- IVDP (Integrated Village Development Project) Scholarship provides assistance to orphan and semi-orphan students with a total no. of 171 students benefiting from the same and Rs. 13,12,500 was disbursed under this scholarship.
- On campus we create opportunities for students to engage in meaningful promotion of services that create financial value, educate and train pupils to stand on their own legs and to support their own education under the work scholarship scheme. This year, in total we received 151 applications, out of which 77 students have completed their work scholarship hours and paid their fees through these earnings.

FR. P.M. THOMAS SCHOLARSHIP

Many orphans' dreams are dashed due to a lack of financial resources to complete their education, and many have been expelled from schools and institutions. To combat this and assist orphans, Fr. P.M. Thomas award provides orphan kids with a full scholarship to pursue their dreams and become successful individuals in the future. Under this noble venture, **Rs. 82,900/-** was distributed to ensure the continuity of the education of these deserving children.

MOTHER THRESA SCHOLARSHIP

I am excited to share with you that a unique scholarship has been established to meet the educational requirements of SC and ST students by paying all of their educational costs. This year, a total of **Rs. 2,09,470/-** was disbursed to the deserving students.

SPORTS SCHOLARSHIPS

The College lays emphasis on the holistic growth and development of its students and sports forms an integral part of the development of the youth. Realising this every year substantial quantum of money is offered as sports scholarship and this year **Rs. 8,04,537/-** was disbursed to sports cadets as sports scholarship.

CRECHE PROGRAMME
